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Birding is Addictive!

Several years ago my mother-in-law, Margaret Stryker, presented me with a pair of 7 x 35 Field and Stream binoculars and invited my family and I to join a camping trip to Portal, Arizona. The binoculars were Margaret's thank you for a surprise gift I had given her a few weeks earlier. The gift, Florence Bailey's *Bird of New Mexico*, circa 1923, turned out to be a rare find for my spunky, amateur naturalist mother-in-law. It also turned out to be a rare "find" for me, as well. South Cave Creek's abundant, colorful avian species opened new worlds. One look at the beautiful Trogon, and I was hooked!

The next logical step was to fill out and send a membership to the *Audubon* magazine and join the Mesilla Valley Audubon Society. I spent a great deal of time studying the colorful pictures when the magazine arrived, but I wanted more. So, the next step was to enroll in the first available Community College class in birdwatching. In those days the classes were taught by an assortment of young men who were working on advanced degrees in biology and wildlife science. Class members were a mixture of neophytes like me and various Mesilla Valley Audubon Society founders, who used the classes as an excuse for a weekend field trips.

For all of us, our interest in birding was fed by the passion of the young, experienced instructors like Kevin Zimmer, who is currently leading trips for Victor Emanuel Tours. Watching Kevin spotting the first Red Knot ever sighted in New and Mexico and running a quarter of a mile for his camera, then chasing the bird for an hour so he could get the perfect picture, was inspiring and exciting. Another memorable adventure with a second early instructor, Randy Hill, was spending an hour climbing through the foaming soap suds in the sewage lagoons of Holloman Air Force Base as we chased an elusive Little Blue Heron, only to finally find the bird back at the car where my wife, Barbara, was watching after Randy's five-year-old son, Adam.

It only takes a few adventures like these and many similar experiences until bird-watching becomes something one starts to crave. Indeed, I get restless if I go too long between bird-watching outings. That's why my wife and I load up the scope, strap on the binoculars (we have, by now, purchased a variety of newer and better equipment!), stick in some water and snacks, and head east to the Sacramento Mountains, west to the Gila Wilderness, north to Percha Dam and Caballo Lake, south to Keystone Park—or simply to the pecan orchards of the Mesilla Valley or banks of Rio Grande River—to see what we can spot today. I have become totally addicted to bird-watching!

The Christmas Bird Count is Saturday, December 17!

Make plans to participate in this muchanticipated annual tradition. The CBC is an all-day event that involves counting birds within geographic areas of a count circle that extends from the river to Dripping Springs and from the Jornada to the South Valley. We finish up with a no-host dinner at the end of the day, when everyone goes over their list and we figure out the day's total number of species and individuals.

This is a fun, low-pressure outdoor event; the only prerequisite is enthusiasm. You can even do a partial day if it better fits your schedule.

The Mexican Spotted Owl in the Gila National Forest of New Mexico. November

16. Gill Sorg has been working for the past two field seasons on the threatened MX Spotted Owl in the Gila. He has both still and video pictures of the owls' behavior to present. He will show how the owl has been thriving, or not, with the recent weather changes there. The project is a

study looking at the influence of noise on the owl's reproduction and behavior while the German Air Force does training exercises in the mountains. Habitat studies will be also presented, for definition of critical habitat.

Winter Birds of the Mesilla Valley and CBC. December 14. To help us prepare for the upcoming Christmas Bird Count, Lorraine Schulte will review some common, and not so common, winter residents and visitors to southern New Mexico. Movie Description—Winged Migration (2001, 90 minutes, rated G) While everyone is aware that birds fly south for the winter and return home in the spring, few are aware of just how arduous the journey can be. Jacques Perrin, a noted actor and film producer in his native France, decided to document this process, using flocks of birds who had been trained to ignore the distractions of his camera crew, and employing a variety of state-of-the-art technology to capture as unobtrusively as possible the flight paths of different birds from around the globe. The result was Winged Migration, a visually dazzling documentary that records the flight of dozens of different birds as they follow their navigational instincts and make the taxing journey to more temperate climates in the fall, all chronicled without the use of narration. The first directorial effort for Perrin, Winged Migration received an Academy Award nomination for Best Documentary

LCMNH Trip to Bosque del Apache: December 3.

Join the Las Cruces Museum of Natural History on an all-day nature trip to the Bosque del Apache National Wildlife refuge, December 3, 2005. Participants will meet at the museum at 6:00 AM to catch a bus to the wildlife refuge and will return to the museum later that day at approximately 4:00 pm.

The Bosque del Apache is one of the most spectacular refuges in North America. This 57,191 acre refuge straddles the Rio Grande Valley in Socorro County, New Mexico, consisting of upland desert, cottonwood forests, man-made marshes, streambeds, and farm fields. Join the LCMNH on an all day trip to the refuge, which is famous for its wintering flocks of snow geese, raptors, and cranes.

Please call the museum at 522-3120 to pre-register as space is extremely limited. (Minimum number of participants required.) Cost for this trip is \$30 and includes round-trip, motor coach transportation, park fee, refuge tour, and discussion about birds. Participants will provide their own lunch.

Field Trips



Field trips are free and open to the general public. Entry fees to some areas may be required and driving costs are shared. On all field trips wear appropriate clothing and bring water and binoculars.

Elephant Butte & Vicinity. November 12.

If we are able to obtain permission to bird a property just east of Truth or Consequences and south of Elephant Butte, that will be the main focus of our trip. That area includes some bosque woodlands, farm fields planted with millet to attract birds, and a shallow lake surrounded by dense stands of salt cedar. The area should provide lots of sparrows, juncos, and several species of ducks and water birds. If that does not work out, we will bird the upper part of Caballo Reservoir, Palomas Marsh, and Elephant Butte Dam State Park. We will meet at K Mart on Hwy 70 at 7 AM and should return to Las Cruces in the early afternoon (between 1 and 2 PM). Participants may wish to bring a lunch and we can picnic at the State Park while birding. For more information, contact Walt Whitford (521-1358).

Field Trip Report

Black Range and Headwaters of Percha Creek. October 22. Seventeen birders traveled to the headwaters of Percha Creek in the Black Range for this trip. It was a gorgeous day—sunny and warm with clear blue skies. We saw a total of 23 species—far more species than the trip leader(s) expected! Most notable were a flock of Mexican Jays, a large number of Townsend's Solitaires, a Red-naped Sapsucker, a small flock of Eastern Bluebirds and several Acorn Woodpeckers. There were still some wild daisies and other flowers in bloom and the foliage of the narrowleaf cottonwoods along the creeks was a brilliant golden yellow. Most of the participants topped off the morning by having lunch at the Barber Shop Cafe in Hillsboro.
