President's Message

While there are no general meetings during the summer months, the Board meets in July. We took the following actions at that meeting: (1) We renewed our support for the Junior Duck Stamp Program. Guy Powers spearheads this effort and keeps us in touch with what is happening. Last year's result were excellent. (2) Lorraine Schulte and Sue Hill are arranging a special Alumni Field Trip for all previous participants in the Bird ID Class. (3) Wendy Davis, working with Bill Glenn, DABCC, has scheduled another Bird ID class for this fall. (4) The Potluck has been rescheduled for October 3rd, and (5) our chapter is supporting the publication of a New Mexico supplement to be distributed with the Audubon Adventures materials to the schools.

A group of us met to discuss this project with Helen Haskell, Albuquerque Chapter Audubon Adventures Chairperson, and Lauren Parmelee, Director of Education for Randall Davey Audubon Center. After much discussion and reviewing of other state publications, we decided that the production of a state-wide New Mexico supplement was both appropriate and feasible. Lauren will be the project co-ordinator and will communicate with the state chapters as well as contacting some of the other states that produce a supplement. This project will be on the agenda of the State Audubon Council meeting in October. We will also be contacting local teachers for their input. I think this can be a real plus for our state.

There are a number of interesting events to look for this fall and winter. The migrants have started to arrive, we have our rescheduled Potluck, the Christmas Birdcount takes place December 15, and we elect Board Members and Officers in January. Please give strong consideration to serving your chapter. Volunteerism plus new ideas help keep this a vibrant chapter. Speaking of which, I hope you have noticed how nice 'our median' looks. Thanks to all the volunteers who have helped keep it clean.

Potluck, October 3

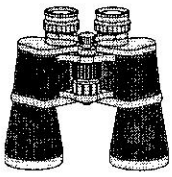

Field Trips

San Andres Mountains. September 8. Ed Fredrickson will once again be leading us into these mountains northeast of Las Cruces, which are normally closed to public access. Bring your lunch, water, and favorite hat as we venture into the San Andres Mountain Range for a full day of birding. Four-wheel-drive vehicles are required as we pass through several distinct habitat types. So, please bring your four-wheel-drive vehicle and room for a friend. We will meet at Shorty's Shell Station at the corner of Highway 70 and Jornada Road at 7:00 AM. Expect to return to Shorty's by 3:00 PM. Several short hikes through an arroyo system and upper-elevation savannah systems are planned so bring your hiking boots.

Percha Dam. September 22. This trip will explore some of the riparian habitats and bosque protected along the Rio Grande in this state park north of Hatch. The trip will depart from the K-Mart on Highway 70 at 7 AM, returning around 2 PM. The trip will probably involve about 3 hours of birder-paced walking. Dripping Springs. October 6. Tucked at the base of the Organ Mountains, Dripping Springs offers spectacular views as well as interesting birding. We've got a good chance to see some foothills specialties like Black-chinned and Rufous-crowned Sparrows, Townsend's Solitaires, and Scrub Jays. We'll be leaving from the Bank of the Rio Grande at the corner of Telshor and University at 8:00 AM. Plan on being out until mid-afternoon and walking about 3 miles of well-maintained trail through somewhat hilly terrain. For more details, contact Nancy Stotz at 521-8087 or nstotz@zianet.com.

Chiricahua Mountains/Southeast Arizona. October 20. These spectacular "Sky Islands" of the southwestern U.S. host many bird species which are rarely seen north of Mexico. Because of travel time (approximately 4 hours, one-way from Las Cruces), most folks will do this as an overnight trip, camping in one of the Forest Service campgrounds along Cave Creek, or staying at lodging available in Portal, AZ. Ravin' About Ravens. September 19. Danielle D'Auria, working towards her master's in wildlife science at NMSU, has been studying the Chihuahuan Raven for 2 years with her advisor Don Caccamise. This corvid, found only in the southwest US and Mexico, is quite abundant and conspicuous throughout the Mesilla Valley. Despite this, there is still much to be learned about their basic biology and behaviors. About to finish up her second and final field season, she is eager to share what she has discovered about their breeding biology and social system, and how this compares to other North American corvids.

America's Redrock Wilderness. October 17. Bob Brister, of the Southern Utah Wilderness Alliance will present a slide show highlighting the rugged beauty of the redrock country, and describing how these lands are under threat from mining, drilling, and ORV abuse. The program will also describe America's Redrock Wilderness Act which would grant Congressionally designated wilderness protection to 9.1 million acres of BLM land in Utah. New Mexico's Senator Bingaman is Chair of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, and SUWA is hopeful that he could become a co-sponsor of this important legislation. Come and learn what can be done to save this immense and challenging landscape.
