## President's Message

I missed the September meeting of MVAS because my wife and I were in Rhode Island visiting family. While in Rhode Island, I visited the Rhode Island Audubon Society head-quarters in Smithfield, Rhode Island. This facility houses several paid employees, an excellent library that covers environments of southern New England, a fantastic gift shop and lots of information about birding areas, nature walk areas owned by the R. I. Audubon Society and trips sponsored by the R. I. Audubon Society.

I was surprised to learn that the R.I. Audubon Society is not a part of National Audubon. They produce their own publications and newsletters, and have educational support programs for schools etc. The R. I. Audubon is supported by an endowment based on funds donated to the organization since its founding and is not dependent upon a "share" of dues from National. The base of the endowment fund grows from "gifts" and fund raising. Member dues support publication of newsletters and some of the educational programs of R. I. Audubon. They are an effective voice for conservation and environmental issues affecting Rhode Island because of their large membership and their focus on "local issues." Rob and Wendy Davis described Massachusetts Audubon as similar to Rhode Island and a completely independent Audubon Society.

My primary goal in my visit to R. I. Audubon, was to learn how other local Audubon groups were dealing with the changes by National with respect to local chapters. While my visit to R. I. Audubon was very informative, obviously an independent Audubon Society has no problems with National doing whatever National wants.

What should MVAS do in order to remain a viable organization serving our members with a newsletter, programs, field trips, and educational outreach (especially Audubon Adventures programs for 4th grade classrooms)? We can make up for the loss of income from the cancellation of dues "share" from National if a significant percentage of our membership join as "Chapter Only" members or include a Chapter Only membership with their membership in National Audubon. At our last board meeting, we discussed ways that MVAS could raise money for programs (especially education and outreach).

## December Meeting Dates

The CBC is an all-day event that involves counting birds within geographic areas of a count circle that extends from the river to Dripping Springs and the Jornada to South Valley, We finish up with a no-host dinner at the end of the day, when everyone goes over their list and we figure out the day's total number of species and individuals.

This is a fun, low-pressure outdoor event; the only prerequisite is enthusiasm. You can even do a partial day if it better fits your schedule.

We currently seek team leaders to lead groups into the various areas, as well as team members. If you would like to be involved as a leader or participant, please contact Tim Lawton (522-2056) or Gordon Ewing (522-3934).

Be sure to attend the monthly meeting on Wednesday, December 10, when we finalize teams and show slides of local winter birds.

There is a \$5 fee to participate in the CBC. This year, Audubon is planning to set up a website that would allow participants to pay the fee on-line, although the website was not complete at press time (www.audubon.org/bird/cbc/index.html).

## Thanksgiving Bird Count

If you're looking for an excuse to take a break and stare out your window on Thanksgiving Day, you might consider volunteering to be an observer for the Thanksgiving Bird Count. Established in 1966, this count requires only a one-hour commitment. Pick a circle, 15 feet in diameter (such as the one surrounding the feeder or water bath in your yard), and tally up the maximum number of individuals of each species seen in the circle (or passing through the imaginary cylinder suspended above it) during the hour.

Winter Birds of the Mesilla Valley.



## Field Trips



Field trips are free and open to the general public Firry fees to some areas may be required and driving costs are shared. On all field trips wear appropriate clothing and bring water and binoculars.

Bitter Lakes National Wildlife Refuge. November 15. More than 30 species of waterfowl have been recorded at this refuge, located northeast of Roswell, where many lesser sandhill cranes winter. The refuge is also host to an endangered fish species, the Pecos Gambusia. The field trip will be starting from the refuge headquarters at 8 AM. To reach the headquarters, head north out of Roswell on Highway 285, to Pine Lodge Road; turn east and continue 9 miles on Pine Lodge Road to the headquarters. Salton Sea. January 16 - January 19. This special trip is scheduled for Martin Luther King holiday weekend in order for the largest number of people to be able to attend. The Salton Sea Wildlife Refuge is located on the southeastern edge of the Salton Sea. The nearest town is Brawley, California in the heart of the Imperial Valley. More than 375 species of birds have been recorded in the Salton Sea and Imperial Valley Regions. While shore birds and waterfowl are the most abundant birds at the refuge, there are numbers of raptors including Peregrine Falcons and Bald Eagles. ### Field Trip Report

Katfish Kove. September 20. Ten Audubon members spent a pretty fall day in the vicinity of Katfish Kove N. of Deming and S. of the City of the Rocks State Park. The unanimous decision was that the warbler migration was over and the sparrow migration was in full swing. We saw a total of 55 species, including many raptors along the road (both Prairie and Peregrine Falcons, and a Ferruginous Hawk). The highlights at Katfish Kove were Bridled "Titmouses" and a wide variety of woodpeckers. The dry weather has had an effect on the birding and beauty; however, Katfish Kove is a experience everyone should have. Don't forget to go to the office and pay the \$5.00 fee.


