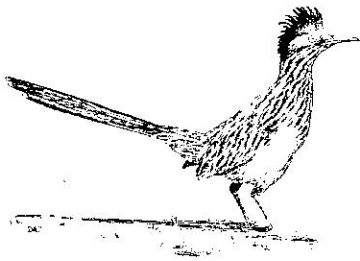

IS YOUR BIRD FEEDER SAFE?

Most of us who enjoy wildlife, and particularly birds, also enjoy bird feeding. It is important that we ensure the safety of our feeders to make sure that we do not unknowingly contribute to the spread of disease.

According to an article by Janet M. Ruth and Milton Friend of the National Wildlife Health Center, USGS Biological Resources Division, there are five diseases that commonly affect bird species: Salmonellosis (from food contaminated by infected droppings), Trichomoniasis (from contaminated food or water), Aspergillosis (inhaled fungus causing bronchitis and pneumonia), Avian pox (a viral infection causing wartlike growths), and Mycoplasmosis (from airborne droplets, dust, or direct contact causing an infection of the eye membranes.)

Ruth and Friend suggest the following steps to help prevent the spread of disease at our feeders. Avoid crowding by providing ample feeder space. Keep your feeder area clean of waste food and droppings. Use feeders without sharp points since even a small scratch can allow bacteria and viruses to infect an otherwise healthy bird. Clean and disinfect feeders regularly. Use one part liquid household chlorine bleach to nine parts tepid water. Make enough solution to immerse an empty feeder completely for two to three minutes. Allow to air dry. Once or twice a month should do, but clean weekly if you notice sick birds. Discard food that smells musty, is wet, or has fungus. Keep rodents out of stored food as they can spread bird diseases. Encourage others to follow these precautions.

Follow these precautions and we will all be able to enjoy healthy birds at our feeders. 🐦

CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT

The Christmas Bird Count was held on December 20, 1997. Twenty-nine counters in the field saw 108 species which turns out to be about average for the 23 years that the count has been running. We saw 28,684 individual birds which is the third highest on record. One bird was new to the count, a Scissor-tailed Flycatcher. The following birds set new records for numbers on our count: Cattle Egret - 17, White-winged Dove - 7294, and Mourning Dove - 5405. Unfortunately we missed seeing the following regulars, Common Moorhen (seen on all of our counts except this one) and Sage Sparrow (missing on only one other count).

It was a good year, considering the weather was miserable and we had no major invasions such as last year's Red Crossbills.

BIRDATHON 1998

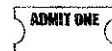
CHECK IT OFF! ON YOUR STATE TAX RETURN

PROGRAMS

March 18. Forests Forever!

This slide show, presented by Jeremy Kruger, focuses on the Southwest Forest Alliance's vision for the conservation and restoration of National Forests in the Southwest. These forests are critical in the mission of Audubon to preserve habitat for birds and other wildlife.

April 15. The Aplomado Falcon.

Jennifer Atchley will talk about the Aplomado Falcon and her 1½ years helping on research in Northern Chihuahua, Mexico. This bird, extirpated in New Mexico, may be making a comeback.



FIELD TRIPS

New Mexico weather is changeable. Layered clothing, water, and sunscreen are always good ideas no matter what time of year you are outdoors.

March 28, Saturday. Gila and Surrounding Area.

This full day trip will depart at 7 AM from the KMart parking lot on N. Main St. We will have an excellent chance to observe Common Black-Hawks at our first stop, as well as Vermilion Flycatchers, Lucy's Warblers, and other returning migrants. Later, among the Sycamores at Glenwood, we should see American Dippers. Bring a lunch to picnic. Call Victor Burgett for more information at 521-7098.

April 25, Saturday. Rio Grande Valley.

This half-day trip will explore the Rio Grande Valley from Mesilla to the Texas border, and will include the Old Refuge, the La Mesa area, and Durling's Farm. Returning neo-tropical migrants should be much in evidence. Meet at the KMart parking lot on N. Main St. at 6:30 AM. Picnic lunch optional. FIELD TRIP REPORTS

Hatch and Uvas Valley. January 17. This trip, well attended by 18 participants, yielded a trip list of approximately 57 species. We fled the asphalt jungle at just after 7 AM, arriving at the Rio Grande bridge at Hatch about 7:30. The morning was calm and sunny. Highlights at this oft-overlooked hot spot included 14 Common Snipe, Cinnamon Teal, and a dark morph Red-tailed Hawk. A large pond on the north side of SR 26 west of Hatch sported 3 Buffleheads, 11 Long-billed Dowitchers, many other ducks, and a Merlin. Although the wind came up just before noon, we managed several Golden Eagles, about 6 Ferruginous Hawks, and a possible Rough-legged Hawk in the Uvas Valley. Lunch was had on the wind-swept grasslands and everyone agreed that it was spectacular birding for the dead of winter.

Palomas Marsh and Animas Creek. March 21. Despite dire predictions of rain and snow, 13 birders braved sunny, 55° weather at Palomas Marsh, Palomas Pond, and lower Animas Creek. We sighted 41 species. Highlights were Western Scrub-jay, Cooper's Hawk, Yellow-headed, Brewer's, and Red-winged Blackbirds, Pied-billed Grebe, Savannah Sparrow, Double-crested Cormorant, Bald Eagle, White Pelican, Say's Phoebe, Gadwall, Spotted Towhee, Marsh Wren, Northern Harrier, Brewer's Sparrow, Loggerhead Shrike, Northern Flicker, Cinnamon Teal, Redhead, Canvasback, Lesser Scaup, Ring-necked Duck, Bufflehead, Verdin, Yellow-rumped Warbler, and Ross's Goose.

STATE-WIDE HUMMINGBIRD SURVEY

The New Mexico Hummingbird Connection is a wonderful way to contribute to the knowledge of hummingbirds in New Mexico while learning more about hummingbirds yourself. This all-volunteer study was started in 1995 as a means of helping us all learn more about the hummingbirds in our state. Participants are asked to watch hummingbirds in their yards at least two hours each week and to take note of what plants, feeders, or water source they are visiting, or any other observations of interest. Some participants have found nests; others have noticed courtship displays, while still others have noted how much these fascinating creatures eat.

Enclose a stamped self-addressed envelope and a \$5.00 donation to New Mexico Audubon Council to help with the printing costs.
