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Birds abound In Summer's heat

For many birders the monsoon months of July and August might seem the ebb of activity for the year. Nevertheless, they provide plenty of opportunities to get in some interesting birding. Our area is blessed with a high diversity of avian environments. Consequently, there is always something happening somewhere nearby. Here are a few things to look for during the next couple of months.

Even though Fall migration doesn't usually peak here until September, some species tend to start their return from summer breeding grounds early. Shorebirds should be moving through our area in August and even late July. Look for Least, Western, Spotted and Solitary sandpipers to visit mudflats along the Rio Grande on their way south. Less common visitors include Baird's Sandpiper, Long-billed Dowitcher, Greater Yellowlegs, Lesser Yellowlegs, Wilson's Snipe and Willet. In addition, July usually marks the return of Rufous and Calliope hummingbirds.

August should bring the return of Wilson's and Townsend's warblers. A trip to higher elevations will likely be rewarded with sightings of some of our more colorful summer residents such as Scott's Oriole and Western Tanager. You might even spot a Yellow-billed Cuckoo, which peaks in our area in July, or a Painted Bunting, which peaks in August.

Champion spotters in May and June

Congratulations to C. J. Goin for finding a Common Ground Dove at Mesilla Valley Bosque State Park in May. Kudos to Nancy Stotz for spotting an Orchard Oriole at that same park, and for a Northern Waterthrush found east of Las Cruces Dam.
