8th Lorraine Schulte Excellence in Teaching Award Presented

At our program meeting on April 21rd we honored 7th grade teacher Bill Curtis from Vista Middle School. He was the proud recipient of both the 1rd and 8th annual Lorraine Schulte Excellence in Teaching Awards. It was very special to have Lorraine Schulte present to award Bill with his certificate and check, with several of his colleagues and representatives from the school board in attendance.

Bill continues to be a most caring and conscientious teacher encouraging his students to care for their environment and to help preserve the natural beauty of our earth. His students travel to the Bosque Del Apache, Elephant Butte Dam and other places learning about good conservation practices. He recognizes the diversity within his student body and encourages each and everyone of them to consider pursuing a career in fields that will impact their environment.

House Finch Eye Disease Study: Call for Participants

In 1994, House Finches with red, swollen eyes began to appear at feeders in the Washington D.C. area. The infection, a type of conjunctivitis commonly known as House Finch eye disease, rapidly spread through the population of House Finches in eastern North America, where it caused noticeable declines in House Finch numbers in some areas.

To help monitor the spread of the disease, the Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology established a citizen-scientist study, recruiting volunteers to monitor the appearance of House Finches and American Goldfinches at their feeders and submit reports detailing the proportion of birds infected. Because of the goals of the study, observations of healthy birds are as important as observations of infected birds.

Although the disease was initially limited to birds east of the Great Plains, observations made by participants in the House Finch Disease Survey indicated that the disease appeared to have crossed the plains and reached western populations by 2001; its arrival to the west was confirmed with the capture of three infected birds in Montana in 2002.

The Cornell lab is continuing the House Finch Disease Survey to keep tabs on the prevalence of the infection, and this year they have added an additional study to monitor how breeding affects House Finch eye disease.

In this second study, Cornell is asking for the help of citizen scientists in observing nesting House Finches, and identifying and monitoring nesting dates, numbers of eggs or young, and numbers of nests that produce fledglings. By monitoring House Finch nests, participants will help determine how many juvenile House Finches susceptible to disease are produced in different parts of the continent.


Chapter Only Membership Renewals

MVAS initiated a Chapter Only membership option in the spring of 2003. Chapter Only memberships cost \$15 per year, and all are renewed in May of each year (unless you have joined within the last 3 months—we'll catch up with you next year!). To see whether you are a Chapter Only member who needs to renew, check the upper right-hand corner of your newsletter mailing label.

- If you see the code C-n, you are a Chapter Only member who joined within the last 3 months, and you do not need to renew at this time.
- If you see the code C-r, you are a Chapter Only member who needs to renew. Please fill out the form below, and send it in along with a check for \$15.
- If you see the code Nat, you are a member of National Audubon Society as well as MVAS, and you will receive renewal notices from National.

What's the Difference?

Chapter Only members receive Roadrunner Ramblings (published 6 times a year), and all dues (\$15/year) are retained by our local chapter and used to support our local education, conservation, and outreach programs. National members (\$35/ year) also receive Roadrunner Ramblings, as well as National's quarterly publication Audubon Magazine. Most of your National dues are used to support the conservation and education programs run by National Audubon; depending on how long you have been a member of National, MVAS may receive a small slice of your dues to support our local efforts.

Some of the birds seen on last year's trip were nesting Vermilion Flycatcher, Killdeer, Bullock's Oriole and Phainopepla, along with Lucy's and Yellow Warblers, Yellow-breasted Chat, and Green Heron.



Field Trip Report

Percha Creek Headwaters. March 13.

Ten intrepid birders gathered on a drizzly morning to explore some riparian habitats west of Hillsboro. Though muddy roads limited our travels and the birding was slow, the group enjoyed seeing some new areas and gorgeous scenery once the fog burned off. Near Kingston we discovered that the name "Townsend's Solitaire" is a misnomer, as several of the birds entertained us by singing, displaying, and chasing each other about. We were also treated to a striking display flight by a mature Golden Eagle; remarkably agile for its size, the bird repeatedly tucked its wings tightly and swooped almost straight up and down near a craggy cliff face (its nest site, perhaps?).
